SAN FRANCISCO, CA — January 14, 2026 — Carnaval San Francisco is back! As the San Francisco Bay Area prepares to host the FIFA World Cup™, one of the city's most iconic cultural celebrations is stepping onto the global stage. Free and open to the public, Carnaval San Francisco returns Memorial Day weekend for its 48th annual festival, unveiling a timely new theme: “La Copa del Pueblo - The People's Cup.”

Like Carnaval, fútbol is for everyone: it connects us, inspires us, and fills our neighborhoods with unstoppable energy.”

The weekend culminates with Carnaval's Grand Parade featuring dazzling costumes, boisterous live music, and vibrant dance ensembles. **Grandstand tickets: \$35, VIP viewing available.**

The procession begins at the corner of 24th and Bryant streets, moves west to Mission Street, continues north on Mission to 15th Street, turns east on 15th & Mission Street (20 City Blocks), and concludes at South Van Ness Avenue. This spectacular parade is the culmination of Carnaval San Francisco's two-day celebration, bringing more than 3,000 dancers, musicians, and artists representing the diverse cultures from Brazil, Mexico, Cuba, Puerto Rico, Panama, Colombia, Bolivia, Trinidad & Tobago, Nicaragua, Guatemala, El Salvador, and more. With dazzling floats, vibrant costumes, and non-stop movement, it is a living exhibition of unity and cultural memory.
